A Note from Tonya about the exciting changes she has in store for our children's programs:



Liz likes—Liz Coronado

In this town, anyone is replaceable. . . .

After a tragic chain of events led to the deaths of their spouses two years ago, D.C. philanthropist Sloane Chase and Senator Whit Montgomery are finally starting to move on. The horrifying ordeal drew them together, and now they're ready to settle down again; with each other.

As Sloane returns to the world of White House dinners and political small talk, this time with her new husband, she's also preparing for an upcoming hip replacement, the latest reminder of the lupus she's managed since her twenties. With their hectic schedules, they decide that hiring a home health aide will give Sloane the support and independence she needs post surgery. And they find the perfect fit in Athena Karras.

Seemingly a godsend, Athena tends to Sloane and even helps her run her charitable foundation. But Sloane slowly begins to deteriorate, a complication, Athena explains, of Sloane's lupus. As weeks go by, Sloane becomes sicker, and her uncertainty quickly turns to paranoia as she begins to suspect the worst. Why is Athena asking her so many probing questions about her foundation, as well as about her past? And could Sloane be imagining the sultry looks between Athena and her new husband?

Riveting, fast-paced, and full of unbelievable twists, The Senator's Wife by Liv Constantine is a psychological thriller that upends the private lives of those who walk the halls of power. Because when you have it all, you have everything to lose. This author was a first for me, and I didn't realize the author was two people until the end. I was totally thrown off by the red herrings in this psychological twister. I couldn't make up my mind about Whit until near the end, and the plot twist was one I thoroughly enjoyed. I would certainly recommend this book to others.

Choice for children—Tonya Bordner

When a local teacher recommended this book after her son read it to her, I knew I had to read it. Not only did she recommend it, but so did her 10 year old. It would be appropriate for third up through middle school.

Stuck by Jennifer Swender, a former teacher, is told from the perspective of a fourth grader who moves a lot and struggles in school. Although he's reluctant at first, he finds community as his classmates and teacher empower him to reach his goal: being a part of the Safety Patrol.

It would be a good read in the classroom setting or at home to teach compassion, acceptance and perseverance. I was so intrigued by the language, I'm in the middle of another **Swender** book, *Solving for M*. If you have a student who enjoys math or needs wider exposure to math, I recommend this one as well!

Fran recommends—Fran Kovach


Cybersecurity, what's that? To find out more about this topic, read *Cybersecurity for dummies 2nd edition* by **Joseph Steinberg**. The book is one of the many for dummies Learning Made Easy series.

The first chapter explains the complexities of defining cybersecurity. The contents at a glance divides the twenty-one chapters into eight parts. A table of contents follows a page by page outline of the chapters.

By developing good cyber habits such as backups, frequent passcode changes, and safe WIFI practices describes some of the proactive moves to be cyber secure.

Explaining recovery using a step by step method for multi-platforms and devices is the most useful information found in this edition.

Discussing emerging technologies, artificial intelligence (AI) and future cyber threats was intriguing. Are we carefully watching our devices or are they watching us?




YA perspective—Reagan Bordner

The show did a good job following the events and details in the book, but there is just something "more" about the book. The classic, the book was better. It just goes into more detail and has little aspects that were left out in the show that make the story stronger.





I also believe that these two authors worked very well together to create this hilarious story, Gaiman being good at keeping plot working while Pratchett is good at humor and absurdity. I would give this book a try if you want a laugh, and if you enjoy it, maybe even check out the show.
