


#### Liz likes—Liz Coronado

**Promises and Pomegranates** by **Sav R Miller**, is a retelling of the story of Hades and Persephone. I am a big fan of any book that has a storyline based on Greek mythology. This book brings them to us in the form of Kal and Elena. When I tell you I could not get through this book fast enough!

Elena's future is completely upended when on her wedding day, her fiancé is killed and another man subbed into his place. That other man is Kal Anderson - a doctor and hit man working with her father. Kal has so many secrets, it's impossible to know him. He's violent and rough and for all intents and purposes, deranged. But she can't fight the pull toward his darkness. From the onslaught you'll have so many questions. They all are answered, eventually, but the story arc to get there is enough to keep you engaged and begging for more.

Kal is an assassin for the mafia and he has his eyes on Elena. He wants to protect her. On the day she is set to marry another, Kal comes in and forces Elena's father to allow him to marry her. There are twist and turns all throughout. Promises and pomegranates is full of just that, promises and pomegranates...but also so much more. There is mafia action, revenge plots, childhood trauma, arranged marriage, chemistry and steam that will set you on fire, fights, love, fighting for love, parents and disappointment...it's too much to put in words really. I could not put this book down until the very end.



### Bookmarked—Iolaine Konstantinidis

Just as Fred Rogers inspired many children by his TV show *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*, the book, *When You Wonder You're Learning: Mr. Rogers' Enduring Lessons for Raising Creative, Curious, Caring Kids* by Gregg Behr and
Ryan Rydzrewski offers inspiration for all adults to be as influential as he was in guiding children. Writing books forward, Joanne Rogers says it explores what is essential about the *Neighborhood* that was built and engineered by her husband.
His legacy lies in the blueprints he left behind-- his tools for teaching and touching children's hearts and minds. The books authors expose the work Rogers did behind



the scenes that delighted children by making them feel safe and loved. They cite studies that demonstrate how social and emotional skills are key to the learning process and delve into educational and scientific research that validates many of the affective methods employed by Rogers in his well-choreographed television shows. The rituals he kept—changing into his soft cardigan and comfortable shoes; looking directly into the camera to ask questions and pausing as if listening to answers; always reminding his audience that he likes them just the way they are---were deliberate actions designed to promote feelings of security and self-worth and to foster curiosity. The authors point out that as we experience more social and technological change the tools that Fred Rogers left behind become even more essential. An effective learning environment where kids feel free to express their ideas and creativity while collaborating with each other requires a focus on affective skills. Now more than ever we need neighborhoods that bring us comfort and community to raise kind and caring human beings.


The authors along with The Suncoast Campaign for Grade-Level Reading and the Patterson Foundation have launched a Book Circle Project to further promote Fred Rogers' philosophy and pedagogical practices. His memory also lives on in the movie *A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood* starring Tom Hanks.

**Anthony Doerr** has written some very popular and prize winning works of fiction. **All the Light We Cannot See** being perhaps his most popular.

But he also wrote a slim little volume about the year he spent as a fellow at the American Academy in Rome, *Four Seasons in Rome*. While there he worked on his writing and his family - recently augmented by the arrival of his two children. The book is a neat view on a writers life and Rome is always an enthralling, or at least interesting, backdrop!

For the past year, I've seen **Mo Willems'** books fly on and off the shelf. Once a reader gets hooked on them, there seems to be no going back. They MUST read them all!

After I recently put a dozen of his books on hold for a rising reader, I decided it was far time for me to sit down myself with a stack of his books.

My expectations were surpassed. I first read *Can I Play Too?*. It is a part of "An Elephant & Piggie Book" series. The first thing that hit me were the simple yet engaging illustrations. All of the text is in speech bubbles, giving it a graphic novel or comic book feel. With the rise of graphic novels in popularity, these books will certainly capture the attention of our youngest readers.


The second thing the teacher in me noticed was the text included repeating words that are mostly sight words. This makes this series perfect for beginning readers.




### Fran Recommends—by Fran Kovach

## Editors Choice—by Reagan Bordner

Twenty-year-old Violet Sorrengail was supposed to enter the Scribe Quadrant, living a quiet life among books and history. Now, the commanding general—also known as her tough-as-talons mother has ordered Violet to join the hundreds of candidates striving to become the elite of Navarre: dragon riders. But when you're smaller than everyone else and your body is brittle, death is only a heartbeat away...because dragons don't bond to "fragile" humans. They incinerate them. With fewer dragons willing to bond than cadets, most would kill Violet to better their own chances of success. The rest



would kill her just for being her mother's daughter—like Xaden Riorson, the most powerful and ruthless wingleader in the Riders Quadrant. She'll need every edge her wits can give her just to see the next sunrise.

Enemies to Lovers Romance, Magic, Dragons, Found Family... *Forth Wing* by **Rebecca Yarros**, a book that has it all.

This book was pretty fast paced which I did not expect, but also did not mind. What I thought was going to take half the book to happen, happened in just a few chapters. Even though there was constantly things happening and a lot of information being given in such a short time, it wasn't overwhelming and I found that it actually worked out quite well. Also, the beginning of this book reminded me a lot of the **Divergent series**, (different quadrants one of which is a lot deadlier than the others), a series which I really enjoyed when I was younger so it gave me a bit of nostalgia at first. I have also seen people comparing this book to the **Throne of Glass series** by Sarah J Maas, although I have not read this series myself. If you are a fan of either one of these series I think you may enjoy this book/upcoming series.
