

## Liz likes—Liz Coronado

Twenty years after a baby is stolen from a stroller, a woman is murdered in a care home. The two crimes are somehow linked, and a good bad girl may be the key to discovering the truth.

Edith may have been tricked into a nursing home, but at eighty-years-young, she's planning her escape. Patience works there, cleaning messes and bonding with Edith, a kindred spirit. But Patience is lying to Edith about almost everything. Edith's own daughter, Clio, won't speak to her. Someone new is about to knock on Clio's door...and their intentions aren't good.

With every reason to distrust each other, the women must solve a mystery with three suspects, two murders, and one victim. If they do, they might just find out what happened to the baby who disappeared, the mother who lost her, and the connections that bind them.

Good Bad Girl is a wonderful read. Each chapter slowly laid out mystery after mystery and I found myself continuously trying to put together how it would be entwined. At first, it's a bit confusing but the characters were being introduced and I think it was messy on purpose. The twist in the middle about who the two protagonist was a great surprise. Another twist is the murder itself, but I always wonder if some murders are like it in real life. Born out of chaos and bad things happening to good people The main characters, with all their idiosyncrasies, were people I liked with the bad actors being unlikeable. I will say you need to keep track of the chapter titles. My biggest complaint is that the book switches from 1st to 3rd point of view throughout the book. I loved the ending and walked away wanting to read more of Alice Feeney.

## YA Perspective— Reagan Bordner

A runaway queen. A reluctant prince. And a quest that may destroy them both. Eight years have passed since the Battle of the Serpent. But in the icy

north, Lady Nore of the Court of Teeth has reclaimed the Ice Needle Citadel. There, she is using an ancient relic to create monsters of stick and snow who will do her bidding and exact her revenge. Suren, child queen of the Court of Teeth, and the one person with power over her mother, fled to the human world. There, she lives feral in the woods. Lonely, and still haunted by the merciless torments she endured in the Court of Teeth, she bides her time by



releasing mortals from foolish bargains. She believes herself forgotten until the storm hag, Bogdana chases her through the night streets. Suren is saved by none other than Prince Oak, heir to Elfhame, to whom she was once promised in marriage and who she has resented for years. Now seventeen, Oak is charming, beautiful, and manipulative. He's on a mission that will lead him into the north, and he wants Suren's help. But if she agrees, it will mean guarding her heart against the boy she once knew and a prince she cannot trust, as well as confronting all the horrors she thought she left behind.

I really enjoyed this book and I am so sad I have to wait till March to read book two. The Stolen Heir is a continuation of The Cruel Prince series by Holly Black. It focuses on different characters and their journeys, but it references The Cruel Prince a lot, so I would recommend giving that series a read before picking up this book (it is a very good series as well).

Two things I love about Holly Black's books is, one, how morally ambiguous her characters are. Although they work together on certain things, it's really every man for themselves. Their actions may be seen as unjust, but when you take into account their different situations, it's hard to decide who is right and who is wrong. Second, I love how she makes it so that the faeries in her books cannot lie. Not being able to lie really adds meaning to everything that they say and it's fun to try and decipher whether what they say is sincere or if they are being clever with their speech and finding a way to lie while also telling the truth.

The end of this book caught me so off guard and so hooked to the story that I was so disappointed when I looked up the next book and found it was not published yet.. I would definitely recommend this book if you were a fan of The Cruel Prince series or just a fan of fantasy/faerie themed books at all. Five out of Five Stars.



## Choice for children—Tonya Bordner

If You Give a Mouse a Cookie by Laura Numeroff and illustrated by Felicia Bond is a favorite book and classic cause and effect story. The storyline follows a sequence of requests by the mouse and leaves the child, who originally gave a mouse a cookie, exhausted. It starts with eating a cookie and milk, getting a haircut, mopping the floor, napping, and drawing a picture. The mouse is having the time of his life and the child is running around to keep him engaged. Sounds like a normal day for a parent with a toddler to me! The story provides the opportunity to work on the reading skills cause and effect and sequencing.

Numeroff has several books that follow this style including *If You Take a Mouse to School, If You Give a Pig a Pancake* and *If You Give a Moose a Muffin*. The DeSoto County Library happens to also have the book *Mouse Cookies & More a Treasury*. It is complete with stories, recipes, songs and activities. Check it out this holiday season!

#### Flight of the Diamond Smugglers by Matthew Gavin Frank

Diamond mining companies, such as DeBeers, purchased land in South Africa for the purpose of mining gems. Residents were displaced from their homeland and soon became employees of these companies. The residents born here felt entitled to claim the diamonds.

After the table of contents, is a map of the infamous Diamond Coast Frank and his wife Louisa traveled in search of a story about diamond smuggling. Along the way they met a young boy, Msizi, working in the diamond mines with his accomplice, a pigeon named Bartholomew. Msizi expounds on the perils smuggling diamonds and training carrier pigeons to carry the diamonds home.

Pigeons are shot whether or not they are carrying diamonds in the diamond mining district.

People, well, a mysterious Mr. Lester keeps everyone in line. The mere mention of his name induces shudders and fearfulness. The journey, in fact, is to find if Mr. Lester really exists or is a myth. Many fables are retold of diamonds and monsters in an Odyssey style. In the end we find that Mr. Lester, no let's not spoil the ending.


#### Bookmarked—Jolaine Konstantinidis

With the approach of the holidays, I was reminded of a novel I read several years ago in which a murder took place on Thanksgiving Day. Never mind that the author **Louise Penny** is Canadian and that Thanksgiving in Canada, where the mystery takes place, is celebrated in October-- I had to revisit this favorite of Penny's works. Her debut novel, entitled *Still Life*, introduces the reader to the fictitious village of Three Pines and Chief Inspector Armand Gamache, the protagonist in a series that has become eighteen novels to date. I have read each succeeding novel and always eagerly await the last installment because of the initial engagement created by Still Life.

About the plot I will only say that Jane Neal, a well-loved teacher and artist in the town is thought to have been the victim of a tragic hunting accident or murder. The perpetrator, whether accidental or intentional, could be any of several residents as all the characters appear to have their faults. When the Surêté du Québec is called in to investigate, Gamache leads with his methodic and intuitive manner adding a deeper tone to the novel than just a simple who-dunnit. Speaking to one of his agents in his own words:

"...let me tell you how I work...I watch. I'm very good at observing... noticing...listening to what people are saying...what they aren't saying. And this...is the key. It's choice... We choose our thoughts...our perceptions...our attitudes.... So, when I'm observing, that's what I'm watching for. The choices people make."


If you choose to read a Louise Penny novel, Still Life is a good place to begin, but it is not necessary to read them in order. Each has a certain magnetism that draws the reader into the beauty of the setting, the diversity of the characters and in particular the wisdom and charm of Armand Gamache.
